

In commemoration of the 1918 Migratory Bird Treaty Act, which protects more than 1025 species, National Geographic is cooperating with the National Audubon Society, BirdLife International, and the Cornell Lab of Ornithology to launch 2018 as The Year of the Bird. Included in the January issue is an essay about birds by author Jonathan Franzen and several short pieces about birds.

A Gentleman in Moscow, Amor Towles. In 1922, Russian Count Rostow is sentenced as an incorrigible aristocrat to "house arrest" in the Metropole Hotel, across the street from the Kremlin in Moscow. While his sentence could have embittered him, Rostow graciously accepts his fate lives a full life within the confines of the hotel, forming relationships with both guests and employees over the years of his confinement.

American War, Omar El Akkad. A dystopian novel set in 2074 about an American family dealing with the aftermath of plague and the Second American Civil War.



Radium Girls: The Dark Story of America's Shining Women, Kate Moore. A true and sad story of the young women employed in the early years of the 20th century to paint clock dials with radium, which allowed the clocks to glow in the dark. Unaware of the dangers, the women ingested radium by licking their brush tips, with tragic consequences.
