

The Emperor's Children, by Clare Messud

This is a very urban novel, concentrating on such themes as New York City's intellectual rivalries, overwhelmed social services, and the gay scene, focusing mostly on three people turning 30 who were roommates in college and are negotiating unsatisfactory lives just prior to 9/11. That cataclysmic event has a profound effect on all the characters and their extended families, lovers, friends, etc. It is a well-written book by an acclaimed author but on some level I found it tiresome. The characters make very

bad decisions, which is only human, but only the mother strikes me as being a normal, believable, moral human being, calm, accepting, capable of forgiveness. Maybe I'm just getting old!
