American Eclipse: A Nation's Epic Race to Catch the Shadow of the Moon and Win the Glory of the World, by David Baron. This entertaining book focuses on the 1878 total solar eclipse, which was visible in the western states, highlighting activities of scientists who traveled to various locations within the path of totality.

Eclipse: Journeys to the Dark Side of the Moon, Frank Close. The author discusses eclipses in general and past eclipses he has witnessed. One chapter is devoted to the August 21 eclipse.

Hiding in the Spotlight: A Musical Prodigy's Story of Survival, 1941-1946, by Greg Dawson, published 2009, 278 pages



This is the story of two sisters from Ukraine. They are Jewish piano prodigies whose training and promise is interrupted by the Nazis and World War II. After being arrested along with their parents and grandparents, their father helped them to escape certain death on the march to Dorobitsky Yar (site of a mass execution of Jews). Using their wits and false names, the sisters manage to survive the war. Their musical talent was discovered and they spent much of the war entertaining their German enemies. This is the true story of the author's mother, her survival, and escape to America.
