Libraries and the State Budget By Katie Green

The crisis facing our libraries has ratcheted up this budget season. Not only has the proposed State budget again cut assistance to libraries (which have not had an increase in spending for staff or vendors for years despite the rise in prices for everything), but the supplementary grant assistance available in the past from the Federal government has been cut to zero in the proposed Congressional

budget for 2017. In the next week or so the State budget will reach final form. A vocal public has already impacted the provisions therein, resulting in additions and subtractions. If you, or those you who care about and love your library, please contact Senator Howard Marklein and Assemblyman Todd Novak to encourage both to support library funding.

During recent listening sessions, I have heard impassioned pleas from librarians to restore some of the funding they depended on in the past. It's poor economics not to restore funding, as they pointed out, since libraries pick up much of the slack for cuts to agencies that previously supported community well-being. For example: libraries provide a safe, educational and civilizing place for children to gather after school and on weekends; assistance with job searches and resume preparation; access to computers for those rural residents who can't receive signals or other folks who don't own their own computers; help with taxes and locating or connecting with medical or mental health services. This is a far different, expanded picture than that which those who don't visit libraries might suppose.

Book Review

Hidden Thunder: Rock Art of the Upper Midwest by Geri Schrab and Robert Boszhardt By Katie Green

Some years ago, Geri Shrab and her husband paid an unplanned visit to a spectacular Native American sacred rock art site in Wyoming: Legend Rock State Park. It changed the focus of her life and set her on the path to becoming a respected artist. Since then, she has seen, photographed, and painted evocative interpretations of both pictographs (painted designs on stone) and petroglyphs (symbols carved into the stones) in many states and on several other continents. Some years she vends her works at art shows, and her studio in DeForest is on the annual art tours for the Madison area.

Now the Wisconsin State Historical Society has published this splendid book on selected rock art sites in Wisconsin and Minnesota that is a collaboration of Geri Schrab and well-known geologist Robert "Ernie" Boszhardt. Both authors contribute text and photos and Geri's soulful paintings embellish this newly-published volume. Not all the known rock art of our state is listed, as many occur on private property and their locations have to be zealously guarded against further damage from pilferers and modern graffiti "geniuses" as well as natural weathering. Alas, much has already been defaced or lost since white men first described and sketched these sites in the 1800s.

In Geri's words, actual sites inspire her paintings but aren't scientific documentations. She tries to capture the "spiritual or emotional essence" of the rock art after repeated visits in different seasons, taking into account the surrounding environment. Back in her studio, she tries to guess what the original artists intended based on the available evidence and intuition.

On June 3 at Roche A Cri State Park, at 1 p.m., "Ernie" Boszhardt and Geri Schrab will be at the park's combination petroglyph/pictograph site to describe what they know and don't know about it and to answer questions.
