Killing the Rising Sun: How America Vanquished World War II Japan / by Bill O'Reilly and Martin Dugard / 323 pages, published 2016.

I am a huge World War II fan, though I am much more informed about the European theater. This book was very well written and offered new information. The description of fighting, the abuse and cruelty to America's POWs, and the after-effects of the atomic bomb were brutal. The book reinforced my admiration of (President) Harry Truman, my dislike of the egotistical and arrogant General MacArthur, and of Stalin. FDR was fooled by him, but not Truman. The Japanese intended to fight to the death and almost did.
