
### FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY NEWS

### **DVD REVIEW**

### The Man Who Knew Infinity

This 2015 biography-drama is based on a book of the same name by Robert Kanigel. The film will appeal to fans of movies based on real events or people, such as The Theory of Everything (about Stephen Hawking) and The Imitation Game (about Alan Turing).

Srinivasa Ramanujan (played by Dev Patel) is a self-taught mathematician who in the early 1900s worked in a low-level accounting position in his native Madras, India. His supervisor

recognized his talent and encouraged Srinivasa to contact Dr. G.H. Hardy (played by Jeremy Irons), a noted mathematician at Trinity College, Cambridge in England. At first, Hardy was skeptical, but eventually invited Ramanujan to study at Trinity College and he traveled over 6,000 miles in 1913, leaving his new wife to look after his mother. During his five years at Cambridge, Ramanujan encountered many difficulties and hardships. In addition to health problems, he encountered British prejudice against Indians, resisted Hardy's attempts to mold him into a conventional scientist, and continually worried about conflicts between his wife and mother in India. Eventually, Ramanujan and Hardy developed a mentor / friend relationship and collaborated to discover the partition function, a famous equation that is still used in the study of black holes. Before returning to India, Ramanujan was accepted by the faculty as a Fellow of Trinity College.

This film is enhanced by the strong performances of Patel and Irons. Their conflicts – both separate and between each other – seem to take precedence over their accomplishments.
