

Book Recommendation



Only the Beautiful, by Susan Meissner (382 pages). Here is the publisher's summary from the book jacket:

California, 1938 – When she loses her parents in an accident, sixteen-year-old Roseanne is taken in by the owners of the vineyard where she has lived her whole life as the vinedresser's daughter. She moves into Celine and Truman Calvert's spacious house with a secret, however – Rosie sees colors when she hears sound. She promised her mother she'd never reveal her little-understood ability to anyone, but the weight of her isolation and grief proves too much for her. Driven by her loneliness, she not only breaks the vow to her mother but, in a desperate moment, let's down her guard and ends up pregnant.

Banished by the Calverts, Roseanne believes she is bound for a home for unwed mothers, and, having lost her family, she treasures her pregnancy as a chance for a future one. She soon finds out that she is going not to a home of any kind but to a place far worse than anything she could have imagined.

Europe, 1947 – After witnessing firsthand Adolf Hitler's brutal pursuit of hereditary purity – especially with regard to "different children" – Helen Calvert is ready to return to America for good. But when she arrives at her brother's peaceful vineyard after decades working abroad, she is shocked to learn what really happened nine years earlier to the vinedresser's daughter, a girl whom Helen had long ago befriended. In her determination to find Roseanne, Helen discovers that while the war was won in Europe, there are still terrifying battles to be fought at home.
