Summer Reading and Children's Programs


The theme of the 2019 Summer Reading and Children's Programs is "A Universe of Stories." Once again, Kraemer Library joined with the Spring Green and Lone Rock libraries to provide separate programs and events for all ages. Registration is a three-step process. (1) Sign up at one, two, or all three libraries and collect your reading log. (2) Read and attend library programs and any of the libraries and have your attendance marked in the log. Keep in mind that registered children must read 3.5 hours per week and attend one program. (3) Submit your finished log at the end of the program in August to be eligible for grand prize. Mid-July through early August activities for Kraemer Library are summarized below.

Children – Storytime on Tuesdays July 16 (to the moon and back), 23 (day and night), July 30 (gravity), and August 6 (Mr. Sun). Storytime begins at 10:15 am and is designed for children from birth to age 5, but all ages are welcome.

Teens – Teen Tuesday: August 6 at 6 pm – Game On! Drop by the library to

try out some new games and challenge your friends at Sphero bowling and mazes.







Families – Free Family Flicks on Thursdays July 11, July 18, pm.

Other Events (listed below) – open to all. Children under 6 must be accompanied by an adult.


Friends of the Library News


