Only Aibileen (Viola Davis), the housekeeper of Skeeter's best friend, will talk at first. But as the pair continue the collaboration, more women decide to come

forward, and as it turns out, they have quite a lot to say.

**Pottery** - We are pleased to feature Spring Branch Pottery and Paula Barta as part of the P4 event this year. During her last semester of college in 1972, Paula needed one more studio art class and enrolled in Ceramics 101. That was the start of her love of making things out of clay. Her first job was at Flint Hills Clay Works in Marion, Kansas, where she honed her skills on the

wheel. Some years later, she opened her own studio, Spring Branch Pottery, in her renovated barn, firing pots in a hand-built gas kiln. In 2016, Paula and husband Mike migrated to Spring Green to live closer to their daughters and granddaughters.

Paula uses stoneware and porcelain clay to make mugs, bowls of all sizes, platters, vases, condiment dishes, charcuterie trays and more. Her current color palette ranges from cool pastels to vibrant, colorful glazes. She loves to work with customers to create unique special orders. All the pieces are fired in an electric kiln to over 2100°F. Currently, her salt and pepper holders are on sale and display at the General Store in Spring Green, vases at Arcadia Bookstore, and when you order a coffee at Convivio, you may drink it out of one of her mugs. ### **Youth Services**




**Children** – Storytime on Tuesdays at 10:15 am. Storytime is designed for children from birth to age 5, but all ages are welcome.
