

The November issue of the health magazine “Prevention” contains a detailed listing of 30 superfoods that help the body lower cholesterol, reduce blood sugar, fight infection, improve liver health, lower blood pressure, relieve headaches, ease inflammation, prevent cancer, soothe joint pain, and heal wounds. Another article illustrates 15 stretches to ease everyday aches and pains.


The November issue of “Cooking Light” is a 30th anniversary special issue with quite a few Thanksgiving-themed recipes, the magazine’s top-rated recipes, and super-simple soup recipes.

In addition to a long cover story commemorating the 100th anniversary of the Russian Revolution, the October 2017 “Smithsonian” contains a look at the hobby of growing giant pumpkins, both in the US and Europe. During the height of the growing season, they can increase by one to two pounds and require 100 gallons of water every day.

Brief Reviews

Small Great Things, Jodi Picoult, published 2016, 470 pages - Fabulous story of a moral dilemma for the main character, Ruth, who works as a nurse in a labor/delivery unit in a hospital, when her newest patient is a white supremacist. The baby dies, and Ruth is charged with murder. The story deals with race, choices, and prejudice.



Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Redemption, Bryan Stevenson, published 2014, 336 pages - Bryan Stevenson is a capital defense attorney who represents clients who have been sentenced to the death penalty or life in prison. The book does a great job of showing the issues related to mass incarceration, as well as how race and poverty play such pivotal roles in America’s criminal justice system today. I highly recommend reading this book, not only for the information and perspective you’ll gain, but also for the incredibly powerful narratives.
