
Focus on Reading

I will share a few of my favorites in the first few months of 2019, and any favorites received may also appear in an upcoming newsletter or be posted near the new arrivals.

Annual Book Awards

Fall is book award season. The well-known National Book Awards were presented on November 14. The



fiction winner was The Friend (by Sigrid Nunez), a moving story of love, friendship, grief, healing, and the magical bond between a woman and her dog. The nonfiction prize went to The New Negro: The Life of Alain Locke, by Jeffrey C. Stewart, the definitive biography of the father of the Harlem Renaissance.

A lesser-known annual award is the Dayton Literary Peace Prize, the first and only annual literary award recognizing the power of the written word to promote peace. The 2018 fiction winner was

Salt Houses, by Hala Alyan, about the ruptures in a Palestinian family caused by the need to move multiple times due to military unrest. The nonfiction award went to We Were Eight Years In Power, a collection of essays by Ta-Nehisi Coates on a range of topics related to African Americans in the US.
