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#### Favorite / Best Books of 2019 Lists

Last month, I promised a "Best of 2019" list in February. Instead, I'll focus on a "Best Genre of 2019." Many of the books I read in 2019 were historical novels, in which the plot takes place in the past and pays attention to the manners, social conditions, and other details of the period. I will summarize three of my favorite historical novels below. If you happen to read one of these or another historical novel, be sure to read the Author's Note, where the author explains the genesis of the novel and also any historical liberties taken in the story.

*The Huntress* – Kate Quinn. Following her father's death, photographer Jordan McBride joins Nazi hunters Ian Graham, a British journalist who seeks revenge for the murder of his brother, Nina Markova, a pilot and member of the famed Russian Night Witches, and Tony Rodomovsky, a former soldier and language expert-translator to search for and capture her stepmother, a former Nazi accused of murdering a group of children.

*The Island of Sea Women* – Lisa See. The setting of this novel is the island of Jeju, part of South Korea and location of the female-centered culture of haenyo, or sea women. The plot follows best friends Young-sook and Mi-ja, leaders of their fishing group, as they provide for their families while enduring the Japanese occupation, Korean War, and the upheaval resulting in their friendships and families.

The Giver of Stars - Jojo Moyes. The setting for this fast-paced novel is a small mining town in eastern Kentucky during the 1930s. The story follows five independent women who worked as Pack Horse Librarians, part of a WPA program to bring libraries and reading to small communities. The women travelled by horse and mule into the mountains to bring books to community members. The close friendship formed between the women enable them to face and conquer social and racial stereotypes and prejudices, labor unrest in the mines, and clan rivalries.


