Reading Roundup

All The Ways We Said Goodbye – Beatriz Williams, Lauren Willig, and Karen White / 2020 / 434 pages.

Three remarkable women are at the heart of this novel.

As a young adult in 1914, Aurelie deCourcelles was proud of her family estate and history, which goes back to Joan of Arc and Charlemagne. She has little interest in her mother's life as a Parisian aristocrat and the intellectuals who attend her salons held in their Ritz hotel suite. Aurelie was outraged when the German army commandeered the family estate. Aurelie recognizes Max von Sternburg, assistant to the major in charge, from her mother's salons. After her vocal and strenuous efforts against the occupation fail, Aurelie befriends Max with the intention of gathering intelligence about the army's future intentions, but they fall in love. When the castle goes up in flames, Aurelie flees to her mother and the Ritz, escaping with an ancient family heirloom.



Marguerite (Daisy) was raised at the Ritz by the countess following Auerlie's death. By 1942, Daisy is married to Pierre Villon, a Nazi collaborator, and has two children. Daisy is offended by Pierre's activities, and joins the Resistance as a courier working for a cell run out of a nearby bookstore. Her contact person is British agent Kit Langford, (code name Roberte Legrand). Daisy takes the code name LeFleur and continues her courier activities and begins a love affair with Legrand. They lose contact in July 1942 during a major Nazi roundup of Paris Jews. Daisy leaves France with her grandmother and the children for exile in Canada and she loses touch with Kit, who is captured and imprisoned.

In 1964, Barbara Langford is grieving for her husband Kit, who died a year earlier. She has been haunted for years by her knowledge of LeFleur after reading a love letter sent after Kit's return from the war, but he refused to discuss his wartime activities. When she is contacted by Andrew Bowdoin who seeks her assistance in clearing the reputation of his father (a former OSS agent) regarding a failed drop by LeFleur, Barbara agrees to accompany him to Paris to resolve her questions about LeFleur.

This absorbing story of intrigue, love, courage, reinvention, redemption, and forgiveness unfolds as the women's lives intersect in alternating chapters with plenty of surprises and plot twists. It is a good read that you will be sorry to see end.
